Holtville Link Stays Resilient

Kim Vincent, Vet Advocate, Departs For New Home

For U.S. Navy veterans Kim Vincent and her husband, Jim, the military life has been rewarding, offering an opportunity to serve their country while enlisted and now serving veterans and their families in retirement.

"So, you know people who have a smoking addiction? It's terrible but true, my addiction or my passion is helping other vet-

erans and their families," said Kim Vincent, president of the American Legion Auxiliary Bradley Keffer Unit 138.

For Vincent, ever since she helped organize a local flag retirement, laying to rest worn flags with Holtville's American Legion Auxiliary Unit 138, it generated a ripple effect on her involvement with veterans' causes.

Eve Mellinger, an Auxiliary Unit 138 member, and her late

husband, Pete, an American Legion Post 138 member, helped shepherd Kim Vincent as soon as she arrived at the auxiliary, Mellinger recalled during a luncheon held in Vincent's honor at the American Legion Hall in Holtville on June 17.

"Kim was like a daughter to us and she was always the one driven to help out," Mellinger said. "She was quiet when we first met, but now she's blossomed like a flower. We went

around to all the schools to retire the worn flags. She's got a lot of poise and I'm so proud of her."

Vincent and her husband are moving out of state soon to Oklahoma, and the luncheon was a chance for fellow auxiliary members, members of Post 138 and the Holtville community to wish the Vincents well on their journey and honor Kim's tireless dedication to veterans' causes.

Vincent recalled how retiring flags led to organizing the initial Memorial Day celebration at the Holtville Monument Wall in 2013, where Unit 138 lowered the flag to half staff at Holt Park. That effort then led to organizing the first Veterans Day parade in the city to bring awareness to those who made the ultimate sacrifice, she explained.

"We want to keep their memory alive and celebrate those who serve their country," Vincent said. "It brings us together in one community and it's an opportunity to thank the vets for their service."

Vincent herself served aboard the USS San Onofre at the Point Loma submarine base in San Diego in 1988 as a ship's serviceman operating the Gedunk Bar (the ship's canteen). The San Onofre was a floating dry dock for submarine maintenance, and her husband, Jim, served on the

same ship as a boatswain (deck department supervisor).

Once they started a family, Kim Vincent honorably discharged from the Navy to raise her three children. Jim remained stationed in San Diego, but after the 9/11 terrorist attacks, he was deployed every six months, so Vincent practically raised her children as a single parent, she said.

In 2005, when the Vincents decided to build a home, they chose El Centro to make a new life. A chance encounter with an Imperial County sheriff's deputy at her children's school, McCabe Elementary, prompted Kim to ask about volunteering. The deputy referred her to the Explorers program, the sheriff's organization for students.

"I loved it and it was an opportunity to be a positive mentor in their lives," she said. "But that's where I met Deputy Andrew Lowenthal. ... He was the one who recruited me for the Sheriff's Explorers after I met the first deputy at the McCabe School presentation."

Lowenthal, who is American Legion Post 138 adjutant, encouraged Vincent to become an active member of the American Legion and Auxiliary Unit 138

Vehicles Vandalized, Tires Slashed Tuesday Night

The Imperial County Sheriff's Office is investigating several incidents of vandalism to parked cars that took place late Tuesday night or early Wednesday morning.

Most of the damage was in the form of slashed tires, with some of the vehicles also reportedly having their paint "keyed", or badly scratched. ICSO Sgt. Roy Patterson said the incidents were believed to have taken place some time after 1:00 a.m. Wednesday morning. That was when one resident said that he last noticed that his vehicle was still undamaged.

"At this point we have no leads," said Patterson, who serves as Holtville's police

chief. There wasn't any evidence left behind at any of the crime scenes, but sheriffs are following up and working on other methods of locating the person or persons responsible.

The vehicles were all parked in front of three homes near the junior high school on the east side of town.

"We're working to make sure this doesn't become a common occurrence here," added Patterson.

No estimates of the damage totals were available.

It has been a number of years since many can recall a similar incident that affected multiple residents. Graffiti is still a problem in the city but seems to come and go in spurts.

IID Board And Dippy Duck Present 2019 Summer Activity Grants

Imperial Irrigation District water safety mascot Dippy Duck and the IID Board of Directors presented \$16,000 in summer activity grants to eight Imperial Valley communities as part of the district's water safety campaign during the board's June 18 meeting. The funds help make swimming pools and other activities avail-

able for children and adults to keep them busy during the hot summer months while supporting Dippy Duck's message to stay away from canals and waterways. "We really appreciate your help in keeping our kids and adults away from canals by providing safe activities this summer," Susie Carrillo, IID marketing

communications specialist who heads up the water safety program, told recipients. "We thank you so much." In awarding the funds, she praised the success of the water safety program, which started 60 years ago, noting that Dippy Duck, himself, turned 53 this spring. Since 1959, the district has pre-

sented the water safety campaign to children in the Imperial Valley, reinforcing the life-saving message to stay away from canals. Between April 15 and June 10 of this year, IID visited 46 schools and made 140 presentations, spreading the water safety message to approximately 21,000 kindergarten through sixth grade students, reinforcing

Dippy's three main rules:
 • Never swim in a canal
 • Never ride, walk or play near a canal
 • Never jump into a canal
 The grants were awarded to the cities of Brawley, Calexico, Calipatria, El Centro, Holtville, Imperial, Westmorland and the Heber Public Utility District.

while she was still an Explorers' advisor.

"There's a lot to it (working with the Explorers program)," Lowenthal said during the farewell luncheon. "But Kim got right down to it. She's been an invaluable part of my life. Kim has led by example. She puts herself out there whether it's the veterans or the elderly. She will always be a blessing wherever she goes."

Holtville Fire Chief Alex Silva recalled how Vincent took a vision of what was possible and turned it into the city's Memorial Day ceremony six years ago.

"And the Veterans Day parade started out as a thought and turned into an astounding commemorative," Silva said. "Our loss is Oklahoma's gain."

Silva said just a couple of months ago the Fire Department received a referral from a veteran suffering post-traumatic stress disorder who Vincent was asked to assist with. "Kim took it on right away and without any fanfare," Silva said. "That's our Kim."

Carlos Zaragoza, a Post 138 member, said Vincent has done a great job honoring the veterans with the projects she has taken on.

"My brother's name is on the (Holtville) Monument Wall," he said. "Because of Kim, now when kids come to the Memorial Day ceremony, it has a lot more meaning for them and the whole community."

At an American Legion dinner, when Vincent attended her first Unit 138 meeting, she met John and Shirli Strong. It was Shirli who mentored Vincent on how to manage Unit 138 affairs once Vincent was elected president of the auxiliary. And it was Shirli who introduced Vincent to Becky McNeil, another veteran who eventually became a resident at the Blossom Valley Inn, the assisted living facility at 708 E. Fifth St. in Holtville. Strong visited McNeil on holidays and looked after her welfare. It was that initial introduction that led Vincent and Unit 138 to become involved with Blossom Valley Inn.

"In the first Veterans Day parade (2013), Blossom Valley Inn had all the resident vets sitting on a couch in a flatbed truck and they loved it, just to be in a parade again," Vincent said. "That gave us the idea to show appreciation to the Blossom vets every Christmas and Easter. We're super proud to let them know they're not forgotten."

Thanks to Assembly Member Eduardo Garcia, Vincent was named Veteran of the Year for the 56th District in 2017 for her volunteer efforts. She was invited to Sacramento for an appreciation luncheon and toured the state Capitol. She got to sit in the

Assembly when Garcia was speaking on a bill he sponsored.

"When we got to go down to the Assembly floor there was an electronic billboard with my name on it as Veteran of the Year --- and I got my picture taken with the Assemblyman," Vincent remembered. "It was an impactful and very humbling moment."

Despite her move to a new home this summer, Vincent is not finished with Holtville. She is spearheading efforts to have the overpass of State Route 115 North that spans the Alamo River Trail named in honor of U.S. Marine Cpl. Eric H. Silva, who was killed

in action in Iraq in 2003.

The proposal to install a sign with Silva's information on that portion of the SR115 overpass has already been approved by the Assembly and now waits for approval by the state Senate. Vincent said she expects to have a dedication for Silva's sign by Veterans Day. She is grateful for the opportunity she has had to serve veterans.

"I am rich with friends and blessed with time," Vincent said. "Also, I have the support of my husband, Jim. He finally understands me, but it took him a few years."

just \$1 per person, and opening day, June 7, was free.

"There'll be a couple of times in the summer we'll do Movies at the Pool, but we don't have the dates lined up yet," Silva said during a recent interview. "It should be a Friday, one day in June, July and August ... But we're not going to show 'Jaws.'"

Movies at the Pool will open at 6 p.m. The film screens at dusk, around 7:30 p.m., and the pool closes when the movie is done.

In addition to opening day, admission on Independence Day is also free to the public, Silva said.

"We'll have hot dogs and

punch, and it's donated by the Firefighters Association," Silva said. "We're done by 4 p.m. That gives everybody a chance to go to the fireworks at (Imperial Valley College) or here in town (front-yard fireworks)."

Enjoying the pool after a hard day's work recently was Salvador Ornelas. He is employed as an "icer" at Southland Cooling in El Centro.

"I've been coming here since I was small," he said. "It brings back memories of when I was a kid."

Ornelas was accompanied by his two daughters, Anabelle, age 8, and Elizabeth, age 11.

"It's fun getting wet,"

Anabelle said. Older sister Elizabeth chimed in, "Swimming is fun and also splashing people."


Despite a recent revamp of lifeguard and swimming instructor job descriptions, Holtville has a complete staff for the pool this summer; there are six lifeguards and two swimming instructors.

Sean McLaughlin, a 2019 Holtville High School graduate, has returned for another year as a lifeguard. He started last year when he and a high school pal decided to sign up.

"I'm here again because I know so many of the lifeguards," McLaughlin said. "It's fun and a good job for a high school student."

Yet safety comes first. McLaughlin said he keeps chil-

dren from injuring themselves and that is why running is not allowed at poolside since it is too easy to slip and fall.

"If someone is a real small kid, I like their parents to be with them," McLaughlin said. "It's better if they're not floating around themselves."

Even local celebrity Brooke Butler has a long association with the pool. The 2018 Carrot Festival Queen and 2019 Holtville High School graduate said she has been swimming at the pool since she was 4 years old.

"I started in the Sting Rays (nonprofit competitive swim team) at 7 and swam freestyle and backstroke in competition until 16, and I won first and second place a couple of times," said Butler, who is headed to Imperial Valley College in the fall to enter the nursing program.

"I like it because it allows me a role to help others learn how to have fun in the water in a safe way," said Butler, who teaches swimming.

Her class starts off with swim kicks and blowing bubbles while parents support their children in the water. "We usually have toys

and also do a little bobbing on the pool steps. It helps with their breathing," Butler said.

It was helping younger her brother, Bryce, to learn to swim that piqued her interest in teaching the activity. She encourages Holtville youngsters to join the Sting Rays or sign up for swimming instruction.

The Sting Rays practice at the Holtville pool after it closes to the public at 5 p.m. The Sting Rays mostly take part in county-wide competition, but the team also swims in Yuma, where league championships are held since Yuma has the biggest pool in the area.

"I've always loved swimming competition," Butler said. "It's given me something to improve upon. And it's a great way to stay out of the heat for summertime."

For those who want to improve their swimming skills, there are four levels of swimming instruction. Beginners, intermediate and advanced are \$30 per student. The Baby & Me class is for children between 18 and 48 months; that fee is \$40. In the

I.V. Cancer Support Center Creates Community Of Hope

Rita Cortez and Mary Cruz-Magana are cancer survivors. Cortez has twice beaten the disease, and Cruz-Magana finds herself battling cancer for a second time in 20 years.

For others fighting cancer, the powerful women are beacons of hope who are now freely giving of themselves what others gave to them over the years -- both women serve as volunteers with the Imperial Valley Cancer Support Center in Calexico.

"I received help emotionally from going to the groups (at the Cancer Support Center). We were informed and educated about the disease," Cortez told the Calexico Chronicle on June 12. "They gave us books, fliers, pamphlets, videos, hats and wigs. They helped us with anything we needed."

"Come to the support groups. They will help you, give you advice and listen to you," said Cruz-Magana, who spoke with a reporter at a mixer event June 12 at the I.V. Cancer Support Center in Calexico.

With another center in Brawley serving the north end of the county for more than 20 years, the Calexico location has only been operating for two years. The mixer event was staged June 12 to celebrate the Calexico center's expanded hours of operation.

"The event is an open house to let the community of Calexico know we are here," said Luz German, a patient coordinator at the Calexico location.

German said last year the Calexico center, at 601 Heber Ave., was only open on Mondays. Now, German said the center is open from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Mondays through Fridays.

Formerly known as Between Women, the Imperial Valley Cancer Support Center started out focusing on breast cancer and assisting afflicted women only. German said with the name change came an expanded focus on all types of cancer and assistance to both men and women.

She said the Cancer Support Center is a unique resource for Imperial Valley residents, offering services to cancer patients they cannot receive from their doctors, such as rides to doctors' offices.

"We provide different types of services here. The first thing the patient receives when they walk in the door is an intake form to provide us with information to help our patients and assess their needs," German said. "Some come for transporta-

tion services. We try to coordinate with their insurance or give them gas cards for their trips to doctors' appointments in San Diego. We are not a medical facility. This is just to support patients with everything they need."

Anabel Valenzuela recently began working as a patient coordinator at the Cancer Support Center. For her, the job is already near and dear to her heart: Valenzuela's mother is a cancer survivor. Working at the center has become more than a job, it has become her support system.

"My favorite thing about working here is how we get to interact with and help the patient, not only financially or with food and gas cards, but with emotional support," Valenzuela said. "My mom being a cancer survivor, I can really connect with patients. It's really nice to interact with people and give them support as well receive support. This way we share hope as a community."

As executive director of the Cancer Support Center and a cancer survivor, Oreda Chin had the gleaming smile of a proud parent at the Calexico open house. The Detroit native shared about her organization's vision.

"Our primary mission is to support and advocate for patients. We help them with office visits, like if they don't understand the diagnosis. We even go to the doctor's appointment with them if need be," Chin said. "There is almost always a language barrier, or the patient is just too upset to understand. The hospital process in San Diego can be complicated. We help them navigate through it all and encourage them through their journey."

Chin explained the center helps patients through their struggle by teaching them how to cultivate an all-around healthy lifestyle.

"We want our patients to have total health, not just get better from cancer. Ninety percent of our patients have diabetes. Cancer does affect them mentally, emotionally and physically," she said.

One example of how the center promotes healthy living is through activities like walking. Chin said the center has a walking group comprised of patients and employees that holds a weekly contest via Fitbit to see who has taken the most steps. Winner of the monthly contest earns \$150. Plans to begin yoga, tai chi and nutrition classes at the I.V. Cancer Support Center is also in the works.

The I.V. Cancer Support

Center is a non-profit organization and has a partnership with Pioneers Memorial Healthcare District, according to the center website, www.ivcsc.org.

Patients find out about the center by word of mouth, local advertising or doctor referral. The center is perpetually in need of volunteers, donations and

funding, Chin said.

"This place is all run by donations grants and fundraising. It is hard work, but it is really rewarding," she added.



AB-617 Anti-Pollution Efforts Were Subject Of Two Public Workshops

Although Matt Dessert and Luis Olmedo's respective organizations have been on the same side in the fight against air pollution in the county, historically they have had tense relations in how each has addressed air-quality concerns.

Dessert comes from the regulatory side, as Imperial County Air Pollution Control District officer. Olmedo, as executive director of Comit  Civico Del Valle Inc., is from the environmental justice world.

"We're all part of this community. We all care about living in a healthy environment," Olmedo said in a June 6 interview, but acknowledged that the environmental justice side has

often seen the regulatory side as representing the interests of industry over the individual. "I would say in all honesty, it has historically felt that way," he said.

That dynamic is changing, however, and Dessert and Olmedo were eager to show the community how far they have come, working together in a process laid out by Assembly Bill 617.

The bill, sponsored by Assembly Member Eduardo Garcia and signed into law in 2017, calls for a community-level approach to addressing air quality in disadvantaged communities through the efforts of an AB-617 Community Steering Committee that meets monthly to develop and implement air-quality monitoring plans, as well as deploy air-quality monitoring devices,

with the guidance of the California Air Resources Board.

Two AB-617 public workshops were scheduled for June 19 in the El Centro Regional Medical Center Community Education Center located next to the food court at the Imperial Valley Mall. The workshops occurred after this newspaper's deadline.

"These are follow-up workshops to keep the energy going, show what we have accomplished so far and show how good the committee is working as a whole," Dessert said during a June 7 interview. "It's also a chance for us to get feedback from the community."

The timing of the workshops was no coincidence. The steering committee is in the home stretch of meeting a July 1 deadline laid out in the bill to complete the

monitoring plan and draft report to be turned into the California Air Resources Board.

Olmedo said as part of that deadline the committee must get at least one more air-quality monitor up and running. Comit  Civico Del Valle, which runs the community-based IVAN (Identifying Violation Affecting Neighborhoods) Air Monitoring Network, has identified an IVAN monitor in its inventory that will be used as part of the AB-617 monitoring plan, enabling the committee to meet its obligations.

Dessert explained that once the committee meets its deadline, the group will be eligible for some \$2 million in funding through the bill for planning and organization and some \$8 million for emissions-reductions projects. The first step is to meet the organizational deadlines.

To keep the steering committee engaged, with an eye toward future emissions-reduction projects, Dessert said the county on June 4 approved a small project to

pave a couple of parking lots at the Calexico Unified School District maintenance and operations facility using district funding.

"It's a baby step. We wanted to show the committee this is what projects will look like and feel like," he said.

Dessert said emission reduction projects funded through AB-617 could conceivably include paving more unpaved lots in the corridor, the purchase of zero-emission vehicles like electric school buses or other infrastructure aimed at improving air quality.

Meanwhile, Olmedo said the committee has been a rare opportunity to bring together the diverse experiences and talents of stakeholders living or working in the El Centro-Heber-Calexico corridor. The public workshops were a chance to show that to the community.

"I'm optimistic. This (AB-617) will do a lot of good for our valley," Olmedo said.





Baby & Me class, children learn to move through the water more independently with a parent's guidance.

For beginners, no skills are required but the minimum age is 3 years old. The intermediate class should have children who can blow bubbles and are comfortable in the pool, but who don't know the strokes. Minimum age

for beginners is 4 years old. The advanced class is for a swimmer who knows some strokes but may have problems with swimming/breathing technique. Minimum age for advanced students is also 4 years old.

There are five sessions of instruction. Most sessions are Tuesdays through Fridays. The first session is beginners, running
