New Developer Kickstarting Dollar General In Holtville

The long-anticipated Dollar General store project in Holtville got a reboot with a change in the project's leadership, a city official said recently.

After being in flux for months the development is back on track again, explained George Galvan, city planner.

"At this point, it's moving forward and a new developer came in and has taken over the project," said Galvan. "The original developer, Cross Development, decided this project was not financially beneficial and withdrew in 2018. But NNN Retail Development acquired the project in January."

The planned Dollar General

store would be a 7,225 square foot one-story building on the northern half of the Browning Trailer Park property on State Route 115 on the city's west end. It would offer similar merchandise as the Family Dollar store a few blocks to the east.

The original project was approved by the city planning department on July 24, 2017. All environmental reports have already been completed.

"In order to make the project work for NNN they will need to change the aesthetics of the building. The size, layout and landscaping will remain the same," Galvan added.

The planning commission granted approval for the modification on May 16. However, it still must need to go

through permitting with the California Department of Transportation. No major changes are expected but since


the project abuts SR 115 the

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No Luck: Rumors About Lucky Replacement Not Verified

With the shelves at the Lucky supermarket in El Centro rapidly depleting ahead of its planned June 15 closure, hopes they would soon be filled by another grocer appear to be premature.

The store at 351 Wake Ave. has been a popular stop for more than two decades and is the only supermarket on the south side of the city of 40,000.

In late May rumors began

circulating that San Diego-based Sprouts Farmers Market was planning to open on the site but a company official declined to confirm that.

Store openings through the end of 2019 have already been announced, stated Kalia Pang, a company spokeswoman.

"We announced all our store openings one quarter in advance," said Pang. "There is nothing specific in the Imperial County Area. But if we do decide to expand to that part of

the state we will reach out to you."

Sprouts plans to launch 13 new locations the second half of 2019, four of them in California, which will give it 340 stores nationwide.

Speculation also centered on WinCo Foods, Inc., a chain based in Boise, Id., that has stores in California and other western states. A company spokesperson did not immediately return a call seeking comment.

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

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Some IVC Grads Lent A Big Hand To Fellow Students

The Imperial Valley College Study Skills Center bustled with energy the last week of May as students scrambled for a last-minute session with a tutor before final exams. The front desk took non-stop requests and walk-ins while tutors hurriedly and harmoniously checked in and out of their shifts.

The atmosphere truly signaled the end of the semester.

That was the scene as IVC geared up for its June 8 graduation ceremonies. Nearly 2,000 students are set to be recognized at 9 a.m. and 2 p.m. in the DePaoli Sports Complex.

Some students will be obtaining their associate degrees and others one of many licenses and certifications offered in the curriculum. Others are transferring to a four-year university, ready to take the next step in an arduous academic journey.

Among those advancing are some who have done much to help their fellow students succeed.

At the study center, student Jesus Fletes was writing complex chemistry equations on a nearby white board as he tutored a group of students. The soon-to-be University of California, San Diego, student is set to transfer after the current spring semester, and is majoring in mathematics.

Fletes has been primarily a mathematics tutor for a year now, and a highly requested one at that.

"For my first year, I'm set to live in the campus apartments," said the 19-year-old. "I really want to get a feel for the city of San Diego as a whole during that first year. After that, I'll consider my options, taking into account my experience."

Fletes explained his outlook on IVC, both as a student and a tutor, and how his experiences there tie in to his future.

"I'm planning on eventually teaching at some capacity," explained Fletes. "Being a tutor has really opened my eyes. I appreciate that I get to help so many students, and I truly love this job."

Besides being a tutor for the study center, Fletes is also the embedded tutor for Math 192, otherwise known as calculus 1. For that job Fletes attends the class alongside students who are taking it. He serves as a sort of assistant professor during class, providing aid and guidance to students when the professor cannot, and also is in charge of tutoring sessions before every class.

"I really want to be a math professor, and I think that my job here will eventually prove to be invaluable practice and experience," concluded Fletes.

Another group of students

Imperial County Spelling Champ Narrowly Misses Top Spots At National Bee

Enduring eight grueling rounds, El Centro's Nathan Ostermann narrowly missed qualifying among top finalists in the Scripps National Spelling Bee at the Gaylord National Resort and Convention Center just outside Washington, D.C., on

May 30.

Although victory eluded the Wilson Junior High School eighth grader, he tied for 17th place in the 92nd Scripps Bee among 565 competitors who ranged from ages 7 to 15 with the majority, 65 percent, from public schools.

"I finished only one round shy of the prime-time finals

(broadcast live on ESPN) so naturally I am a bit disappointed, but it could have been worse," he confided. "This is my best finish by far of all my three years competing. I improved about 300 places from last year."

Nathan has won the Imperial County spelling bee three straight times.


Even advancing to the semi-finals among the top 50 spellers was a stellar achievement. In the preliminary round all spellers must complete a written test of vocabulary and score at least 26 out of 30. Then, in the next two rounds, which were oral onstage spelling, he earned another six points for 32. The highest point total was 35 out of 36.

"The cut off this year was 30," said David Ostermann, Nathan's father. "Nathan is on cloud nine and went out for a walk to get some of his energy burnt off. The (50) finalists spell from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. (May 30), then the top 10 or so spell again at 8:30 p.m."

David Ostermann is a former Holtville High School teacher and also served as the Holtville Unified School District's chief business official.

Some of the seemingly booby-trapped vocabulary questions Nathan had to navigate included if something is cyclopean, answer: massive; pyrosis is a synonym for, answer: heartburn; and what is another way to

Summer Program

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La Brucherie Widened But Other Clogs Beckon In El Centro

Since the long-awaited May 17 completion of the La Brucherie Avenue widening at Main Street in El Centro drivers finally received relief from its irksome congestion.

Still, traffic problems remain in other areas of town and making a priority list to address them can be complicated by several factors, noted city leaders.

Council Member Tomas Oliva conceded Dogwood Road from Ross Avenue to Interstate 8 and Ross Avenue from Lotus Avenue to Austin Road can be exasperating. Both are two-lane stretches in busy areas and Dogwood north of the bustling Imperial Valley Mall area gets especially heavy traffic.

Dogwood was widened south of I-8 as part of the 2005 mall development. The bridge carrying it over I-8 was expanded to a double overpass about two years ago.

The bottleneck at Ross comes because there are no left and right turn lanes at the busy intersection at Austin. It is fur-

ther complicated because the corner is on the boundary between city and county land, and the Central Main Canal passes under Ross there.

But Oliva pointed out numerous roads that seem adequate today, tomorrow could be viewed as bottlenecks.

"I'm sure the city is aware of it," said Oliva. "But because of a variety of funding needs we must pick and choose which projects get addressed. With road rehabilitation we usually rely on Measure D and Local Transportation Authority revenue."

The measure is a voter-approved countywide half-cent sales tax dedicated to road repairs. Funds are distributed through the authority that is made up of representatives from Imperial County and each of its seven cities.

Even if funding is available, often a municipality must first acquire property at fair market value before reconstruction can begin, especially for the widening needed to relieve congestion. Property acquisition helped delay the LaBrucherie project

for years. "Sometimes the property owner asks for a lot more money (than true value) because they think the city has lots of money," Oliva said. "Or else an owner just refuses to sell. Then the only option is eminent domain (lawsuit to obtain land)."

He cautioned even though the California legislature allows cities to invoke eminent domain it is not a preferred option.

"It's a last resort and only if a project has significant public benefit, but cities never like doing it," said Oliva.

The first step in road improvement is often public complaints and Oliva noted the city is receptive to those.

"If the community feels that a traffic bottleneck exists, let the city know," said Oliva. "I'm aware of the limitations of Dogwood and Ross but I don't know if substantial numbers of residents say that it is an issue for them."

However, road rehabilitation priorities hinge on requirements beyond just funding.

The city circulation element (a previously drafted document)

is a map for the city for road projects, David Campos, city director of public works, explained in an email.

According to a chapter captioned "Primary Circulation System," a well-designed local roadway system provides safe and convenient access to all sections of the community and the roadway system should reflect the ideals of the community.

When questioned if Dogwood between I-8 and Ross and Ross from Lotus to Austin Road are now traffic choke points, Campos answered, "We have no indication that they are at the moment."

Asked if the department would attempt to improve these two streets in the near future similar to the La Brucherie project, Campos stated, "There are not current projects for this. We are constantly evaluating traffic needs and address them in our ongoing maintenance programs."

Public works will update its circulation element in six to 12 months, which will provide an indication on growth and areas that need to be improved, he noted.

"The actual improvements may be done by the city or by development as it comes in and creates new traffic congestion," he added.

Asked about the stretches of Ross and Dogwood, Council Member Jason noted Austin abutting county land creates a

jurisdictional question for any Ross improvement, though he conceded Dogwood is on the radar.

"Certainly during holidays we get comments on Dogwood about traffic going to the Imperial Valley Mall," he said. "That's just holiday traffic."

What Imperial Valley residents think is a nuisance would not be elsewhere, Jackson added, citing people he knows that have commutes of an hour-plus for 15 miles in urban areas.

"I don't see anything being planned for Dogwood Road in the near future as far as road widening," he said. "For me, as an issue, I place Danenberg Road from Fourth Street to Dogwood Road as a priority."

That stretch is two lanes with no curb, gutter or sidewalk, he explained.

"It's a safety issue," said Jackson. "Kids are walking in the road. So, if there's a traffic bottleneck, that's the one I'd like to tackle."


Besides connecting to the mall area, Danenberg is near the intersection of Wake Avenue and Fourth St., an area of burgeoning development.

La Brucherie was always the big bottleneck and prior to that it was Euclid Avenue. Jackson stressed.

"But I think we've addressed the streets that received the most comments regarding traffic flow," he concluded.


all who knew him, but especially his children, his grandchildren, and his brothers and sisters.

Border Patrol agents conducted records checks, which revealed that the man, later identified as Pascual Nava-Gutierrez, a 32-year-old Mexican national, had a conviction for Rape Third Degree Felony and Assault 4th Degree on March 20, 2012 in Marion County, Or. Nava received 60-months of probation and was required to register as a sex offender.

Nava was also convicted of 8

USC 1326 Reentry of Removed Alien on May 23, 2018 and sentenced to six months in prison.

The second incident occurred at around 8:55 p.m., when agents assigned to the El Centro Station encountered a man suspected of illegally entering the U.S. approximately 29 miles west of the Calexico West Port of Entry.

Border Patrol agents conducted records checks, which revealed the man, later identified as Valentin Valdivia-Alvarez, a 47-year-old Mexican national, had convictions in 1997 for Lewd/Lascivious Acts W/Child of and Sex with a Minor. Valdivia received a one-year jail sentence and five years' probation.

Valdivia was previously ordered removed from the U.S. March 24, 2011.

Nava and Valdivia are being held in federal custody pending further criminal prosecution.

In fiscal year 2019, El Centro Sector Border Patrol agents have arrested and removed 18 individuals either convicted or wanted on sexual assault charges after they entered the United States illegally.

Man Arrested Transporting 25 Pounds of Meth

El Centro Sector Border Patrol agents working at the Highway 86 immigration checkpoint arrested an individual suspected of smuggling methamphetamine on June 1.

The incident occurred at approximately 11:55 a.m., when a 27-year-old man driving a black 2012 Jeep Wrangler approached the checkpoint. A Border Patrol canine detection team alerted to the vehicle. Agents sent the vehicle to secondary inspection for further investigation.

While in secondary inspection, Border Patrol agents discovered 22 packages hidden inside a spare tire that was mounted on the rear door. Agents determined that the substance in the packages was consistent with the characteristics of methamphetamine.

The total weight of the methamphetamine discovered was 24.85 pounds, with an estimated value of \$57,155.

The man, a U.S. citizen, the vehicle, and the narcotics were turned over to the Drug Enforcement Administration.



You can either make a deal with sharks, and swim to success; or you can sink, being eaten alive by the sharks. Although this situation is not literal in whether you live or die, it can be devastating to your grade if you don't succeed. As for the student body of Holtville High School, all students taking the senior American Government and Economics Class have to choose to play with the sharks. The sharks include Mr. Smith the teacher of the class, and always two to three teachers or administrators depending on availability. Shorter Calexico East Port Hours Concern Farmers

The federal decision to reduce border-crossing times at the Calexico East Port of Entry will have an impact on Imperial Valley farming operations, industry members said.

Beginning June 3 the port seven miles east of the city opens at 6 a.m. on weekdays instead of 3 a.m., according to U.S. Customs and Border Protection, which oversees its operations. Weekend open-

ings remain at 6 a.m. and closure remains at midnight.

The west port in downtown Calexico will remain open 24 hours a day but there is concern the shortened hours at the east port will exacerbate long lines at the west port.

"Statistics have shown that there is not enough commuter traffic during this time-frame to justify the extended early morning hours (at the east port) and increase in operating costs," an agency press release stated about the

reasons for the change.

While the hours of 3-6 a.m. may not seem like prime crossing hours, they are for farming. During the busy winter harvest season migrant workers begin their day well before dawn in lines to cross the border.

Upon hearing of the change, Holtville grower Jack Vessey said he contacted Brea Mohamed, executive director of the Imperial County Farm Bureau, who then arranged a meeting between Customs, the Farm Bureau and the Imperial Valley Vegetable Growers Association.

"We were fearful of what that would do for the workers who come from the east side of Mexicali because it would add so much time to their workday. The one thing that cannot be avoided is the heat. Farm labor needs to be done at early hours," Vessey said.

Mohamed said the hours change may force growers to

alter the hours for their workers.

"The majority of labor contractors pick-up at the west port. The long-term permanent workers are the ones who are going to be affected," she said.

Vessey said he was pleased with the outcome of the meeting, noting Customs promised to work to ease any congestion at the west port that may result.

"(Area Port) Director (David) Salazar said he would open all the lanes downtown from 3 to 6 a.m. and if it gets backed up they would investigate opening the east port earlier," he said. "Our meeting was very fruitful, and they encouraged us to call if we have any other concerns. I am calling Congressman (Juan) Vargas this afternoon to speak to him about the issue."

Mohamed also said she saw the meeting as productive.

"We talked about numbers and they were going to do some research into numbers but the hope is the other (east) port would become more efficient. We are working with customs, watching it closely, looking at numbers and talking about possible seasonable hours," she said.

In a press release Salazar added the extra hours at the east port had helped ease congestion at the west port during an expansion project that included reconfigured lanes and a new inspection facility.

"We have observed a consistent increase in traffic throughout downtown at the new vehicle inspection facility," he said. "During the construction of the new vehicle inspection facility the extended hours at the East port helped to alleviate congestion at the downtown port. We no longer have that issue."

Shuttered El Centro Burger King To Reopen As Burrito Factory

The former Burger King restaurant at Imperial Avenue and Main Street in El Centro is undergoing a remodel that will transform it into a Mexican-food outlet known as The Burrito Factory, a city official said.

The business application is in the name of Steve Siebert, an El Centro-based State Farm Insurance agent, said Norma Villicana, city Community Development director.

Siebert did not respond to requests seeking further information about the project, including a scheduled opening and menu.

Villicana did note El Centro is pleased to see an entrepreneur is reviving the site, which has a prominent location at one of the city's busiest intersections. Burger King was a staple there for decades before closing about a year ago.

"We're very happy the building is being repurposed and will

not be abandoned," she said. "We're happy another business moved in and hope it helps bring in more business to the Valley Plaza area."

Carlos Vera, owner of Carlos Neon Signs, confirmed on May 31 he has prepared a new sign for The Burrito Factory but said he is waiting for reconstruction to be completed in order to install it.

While there are at least two restaurant chains doing business as The Burrito Factory, one based in San Jose and the other in Charlotte, N.C., it could not immediately be confirmed if the location is affiliated with either. Community Development officials said they had no information on the matter.

Patsy Robinson, a Community Development staff member, recalled the former Burger King had experienced a fire.

"Everything proceeded from that thereafter," she said. "I don't know why it was shut down."

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

To recharge his mind he employed naps between study periods, as well as stretch periods during breaks of the stage spelling. He said it took effort to remain at a peak level of concentration.

"I asked a lot of questions of the pronouncer and tried to focus on the word while I got more information about it," said Nathan. "Some words sound foreign to the audience, but I have generally studied these words and hear them more often."

What perhaps stood out most from the 2019 Scripps Bee was the once-in-a-lifetime outcome:

eight competitors having matched one another word for word over 20 rounds of spelling until the wee hours of the morning of May 31. All were named co-champions. Rishik Gandhasri spelled "auslaut" to claim the first co-champion slot while Rohan Raja spelled "odylic" to be the final winner, according to the spelling bee website.

asked about "Ana" at the front desk at the study center and were instructed to wait for her to start her shift. The students were waiting for Ana Gallegos, another popular tutor.

She is set to double major in environmental economics and policy, and molecular environmental biology at UC, Berkeley.

"I started as a tutor when in my second year here at IVC began," Gallegos said. "When I first started I

was a bit arrogant and, although I hate to say it, I thought myself better than some people."

She explained how being a tutor taught her otherwise.

"After a while, I realized that I shouldn't really think that way. There's so many people with so many stories, and it really humbled me. Seeing the progress and struggle of some students really helped me to see that anyone can make it,"

Gallegos explained.

She admitted some apprehension about leaving Imperial Valley. "My main worry is financial," Gallegos said. "I already see myself being \$30,000 in debt in the next two years. I'm not afraid of being able to pay it back eventually, but at 19 I never thought that I would be making such heavy financial commitments."

shoes "...any advice I would give a student when they ask about this project is be prepared, be professional, have your financial information correct and understandable...if you are an incoming senior, start thinking about the project idea now...". Just like in the Shark Tank show, business owners and entrepreneurs pitch their idea and business plan to the sharks to obtain a deal in return to finance their business. Smith says that on average about 50-60 percent

of the pitches given by his students receive a deal "...some pitches are very enthusiastic and passionate about their product, that kind of energy fires us up as sharks, and an added bonus is when their financial and distribution models are understandable...some projects this year that were memorable were Clifford Schneider's pitch which was "Autobobber" a device that serves fishermen needs by attaching two fishing poles and alerting when a

fisherman has a bite, another great pitcher was Seth Hilfiker's "1st Brother Farms" which to Mr. Smith's knowledge, is a real life business. Hilfiker runs serving the livestock industry, another he stated was "Clip It-3D" which was pitched by a group of students with Aimee and Joseph Larios, Aleyza, and Alonzo Carranza which provided an easier and more efficient way for people with glasses prescriptions to view 3D movies with 3D clip on lenses.

adjacent sidewalks will need to be repaired.
 "NNN needs to go through an encroachment process because the sidewalk is on Caltrans' right-of-way," said Galvan. "An existing driveway must be closed up and sections of the sidewalk are in disrepair."
 An agreement is in the process of being drafted between NNN and Caltrans. Construction could begin in three months and be completed in six months, Galvan added, though he cautioned that is speculation.
 "I don't speak for the city of Holtville, but part of the

conversation from the planning commission was any improvement to the land on that parcel is desirable and the tax revenue will be welcome," he said.
 The city of Holtville would receive one percent of the sales tax with the remaining tax split among various entities, including the state, Imperial County and Imperial Valley College.
 Mayor Ginger Ward said she is looking forward to the groundbreaking.
 "I am hoping all the permitting goes through since it's been awhile and there were some

setbacks," said Ward. "Hopefully everything falls in place and it's on the horizon soon. We could always use a little store like that."

Made pursuant to Section 3361 & 3362, Revenue and Taxation Code

Pursuant to Revenue and Taxation Codes sections 3691 and 3692.4, the following conditions will, by operation of law, subject real property to the tax collector's power to sell.

1. All property for which property taxes and assessments have been in default for five or more years.
2. All property that has a nuisance abatement lien recorded against it and for which property taxes and assessments have been in default for three or more years.
3. Any property that has been identified and requested for purchase by a city, county, city and county, or nonprofit organization to serve the public benefit by providing housing or services directly related to low income persons and for which property taxes and assessments have been in default for three or more years.


